Graduate students will pay more for loans under debt deal

Graduate students wound up on the "Loser" list from Washington's debt deal.

Tucked into the bill that would enact the \$2.4 trillion debt-reduction plan is a provision that would force graduate students to pay interest on student loans while still in school. Currently, Washington picks up the interest payments for graduate students while they attend school.

The cut is part of a surprise compromise that preserves tuition payments for low-income college students under the Pell grant program. While Pell grants were expected to take big spending hits next year,

they emerged almost fully funded in the debt deal, said Terry Hartle, spokesman for the American Council on Education, which lobbies for colleges and universities.

"It was an outcome that was unimaginable just a couple of weeks ago," Hartle said. "For Miami Dade College, the budget agreement is good news. It's not as good of a deal for students, say, at the University of Miami."

While the details were sketchy as Washington raced to resolve a debt crisis by Tuesday, education professionals said the deal will mean real changes to how many graduate students fund their education.

Pell grants account for about \$500 million in tuition assistance in South Florida. Miami Dade College, the largest community college in the country, received about \$175 million in Pell grants for the last school year, said Mercedes Amaya, head of financial aid for the school. Preliminary 2011 figures at usaspending.gov had

MDC receiving \$117 million, easily the top recipient among South Florida schools.

Low-income families and students can apply for Pell grants, and they cover up to \$5,500 in tuition. The interest-free loans for graduate school are also based on need, but students can usually qualify because post-graduate education is so costly. Students may borrow up to \$8,500 a year using the interest-free loans.

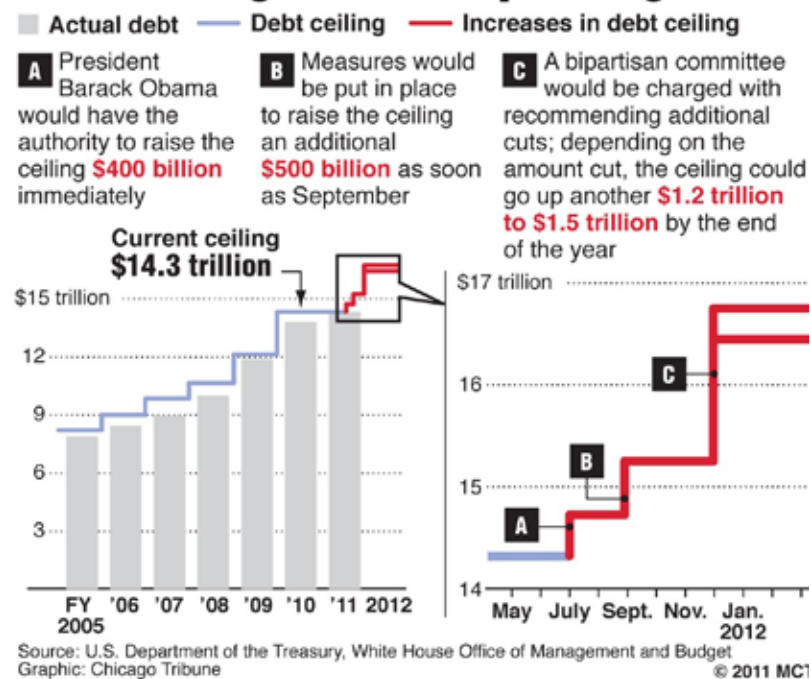
University of Miami Director of Financial Assistance James Bauer said the proposed student loan change would affect thousands of UM graduate students. With interest now accruing while they're in school, grad students' overall debt will creep higher, Bauer said, perhaps leading some to default on their loans altogether.

"Nobody knows where that tipping point is," Bauer said.

By forcing graduate students to pay interest while attending school, the federal government should save about \$18 billion over the next 10 years, according to the Council's estimates. The Pell grants will cost about \$35 billion next year under the debt deal, down slightly from the current \$37 billion funding level.

The changes in graduate-school loans, including those for law school and medical school, would take effect July 1, 2012, so loans taken out before then will remain interest-free during the student's enrollment, Hartle said.

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Blast from the past

Teen Nick brings back shows from the '90s

The Facebook generation gets what it wants. And if there's one thing Gen Yers love more than anything else, it's 1990s television.

Thanks to 20- and 30-somethings clamoring on Facebook and Twitter, Nickelodeon has pulled some of its most beloved Clinton-era shows out of the vaults. "The '90s Are All That," a new late-night block on TeenNick, premiered this week with four shows: "Kenan & Kel," "Doug," "All That" and "Clarissa Explains It All." Viewers can watch more clips and episodes on 90sareallthat.teennick.com, a site that asks, "Remember when your life didn't suck?"

Response has been seismic. On Monday, 555,000 viewers tuned in from midnight to 4 a.m., "Doug" was the top search hit on Google for the day, and the rest of the shows trended on Twitter. Nickelodeon will consider the next round of shows to feature based on online fan demand, including cult favorites like "Are You Afraid of the Dark?" "Salute Your Shorts" and "Double Dare."

That these neo-retro reruns are getting so much love from viewers comes as no surprise to Keith Dawkins, senior vice-president of Nickelodeon Programming Partnerships. Between the demand coming in from social media sites and in the Nick offices, he said it was the perfect moment to re-release the network's '90s classics.

"A group of young interns and staffers showed us these numbers and said, 'We'd love to see these back on TV,'" Dawkins said. "It was a bat across the face like, duh, let's do this now."

James Zar, 19, a Boston University junior, was among the 15 million people who joined one of the Facebook groups pushing for the shows' return. "I think everyone likes to remember when they were kids. The humor was simple and good-hearted, and that made the shows funny," he said of the old-school Nick appeal.

"We were so little and impressionable, and these shows really stuck in our memories," said Jamaica Plain resident Thom Dunn, 25, whose favorite was quirky comedy "The Adventures of Pete & Pete."

Now watching it as an adult, he said, "It's definitely a kid's show, but it's also so bizarre and brilliant."

Everyone has a favorite show from the '90s run, whether it's a Nicktoon or a live-action comedy from the station's Saturday-evening Snick lineup.

"I probably remember every single episode of 'Rugrats,' my favorite being the Passover special where Angelica was the Pharaoh," said Simmons College grad student Bekah Cline, 24.

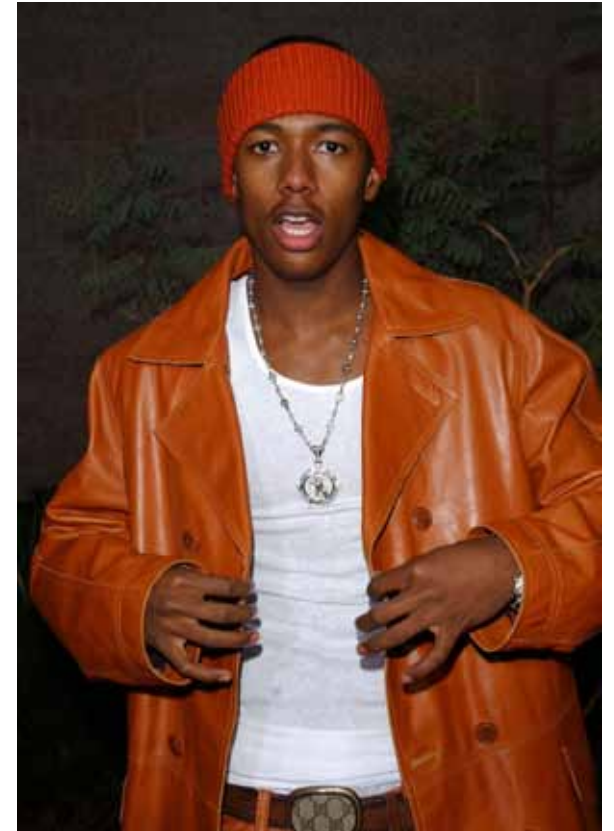

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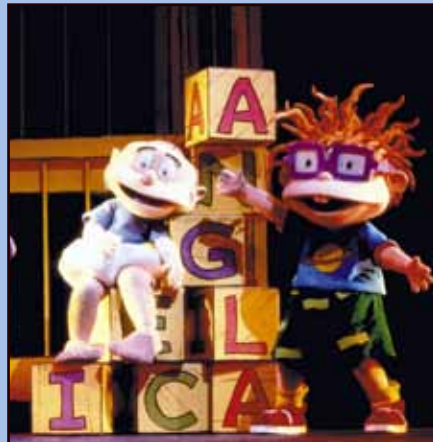
They are finally back; the one thing that me and my friends have been talking about for forever—the shows our generation grew up with and loved.

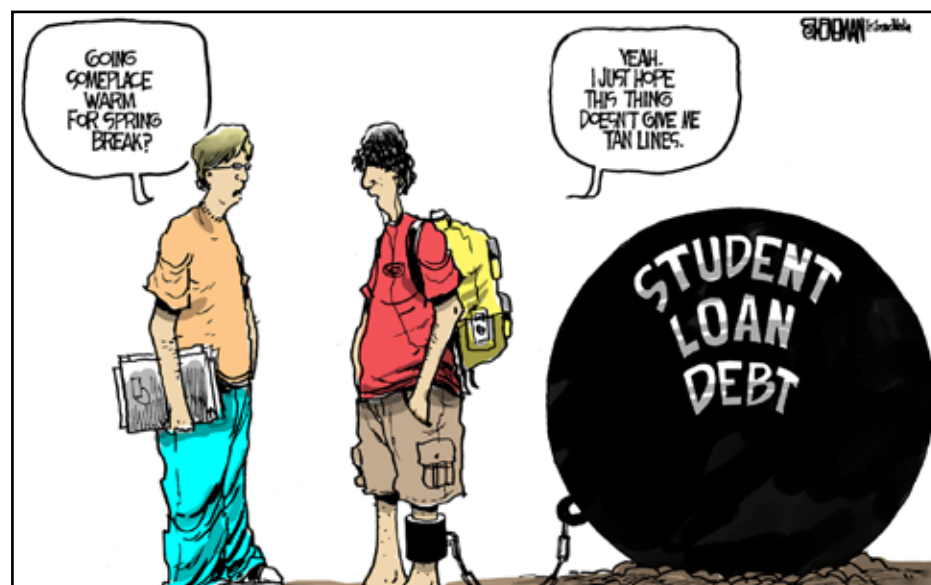
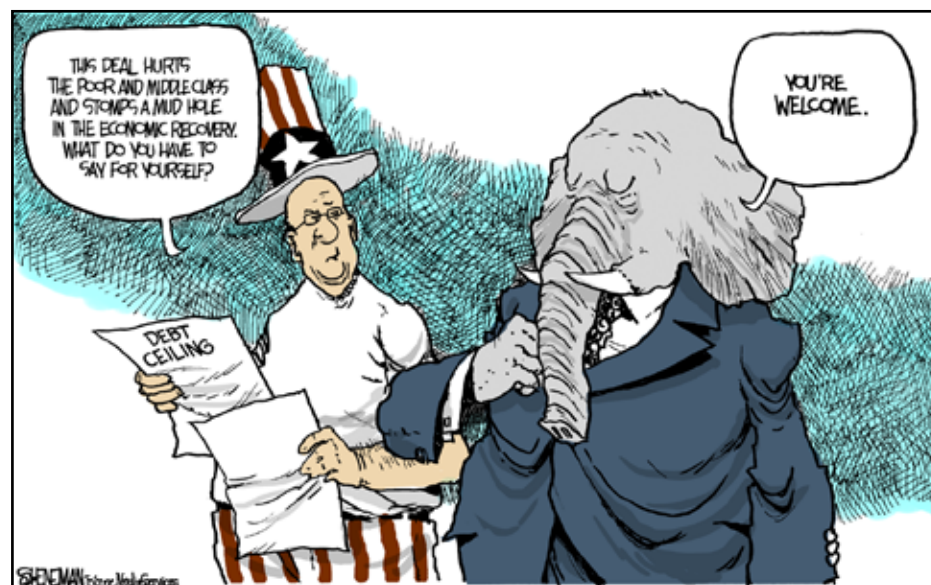

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Partisan bickering hinders progress

Debt deal pulls the curtain back on political posturing in Congress

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The drama is finally over and the House and Senate finally passed a deal to raise the debt ceiling. Thanks to the power of compromise and unity, we've avoided default.

President Barack Obama and congressional leaders agreed on a deal to raise the federal debt limit that includes sharp spending cuts but no new taxes.

Democrats wanted



- Debt ceiling increase to pay bills through 2012
- No cuts to Medicare, Medicaid or Social Security benefits
- Cuts to military spending if domestic programs were cut
- Tax increases for upper-income earners

Republicans wanted



- Spending cuts to match debt-ceiling increase dollar for dollar
- No tax increase
- Limited cuts to defense
- Entitlement reform
- Congressional vote on a balanced-budget amendment to the Constitution

Democrats got

- A debt-limit increase of \$2.4 trillion in three stages
- Increase gives borrowing power to pay bills through 2012

A 12-member bipartisan congressional committee will find up to additional \$1.5 trillion in cuts; may consider tax reform and entitlement changes

- If committee's recommendations are not adopted, half of spending cuts would come from defense; no cuts to Social Security or Medicaid

- Congress to vote by end of year on balanced budget amendment

- If committee's recommendations are not adopted, half of spending cuts would come from domestic programs

Broncos

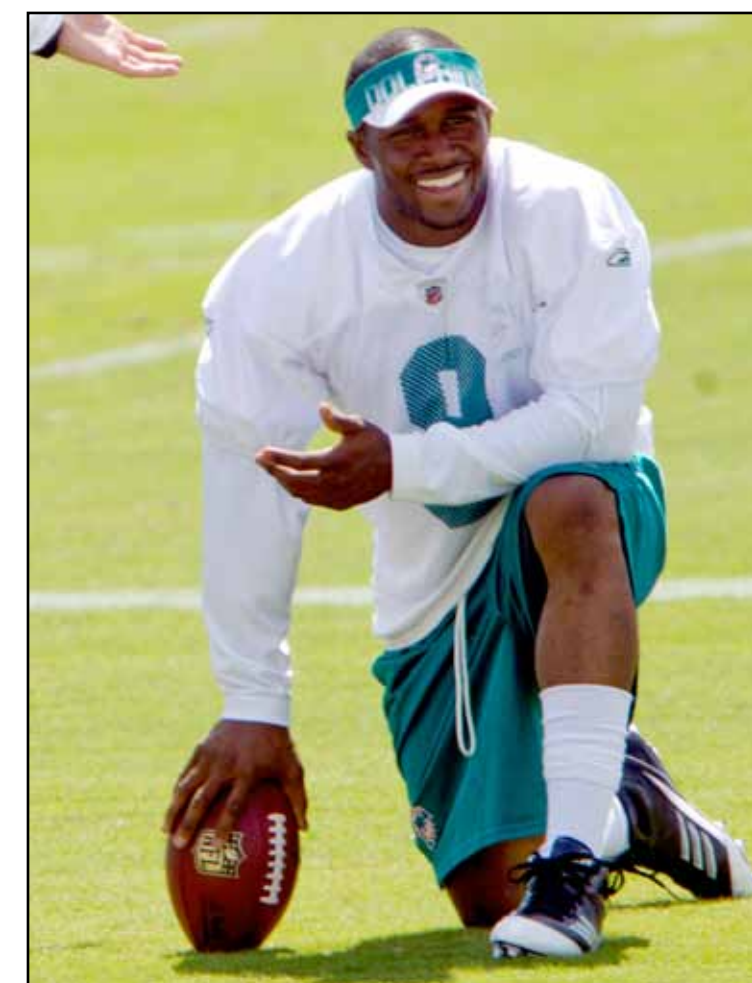
Re-signed Kyle Orton. So now there are three QB in Denver, which might be two too many.
