SGA "Rocks the Vote" for awareness

WEST CAMPUS — The Student Government Association of West Campus held a "Rock the Vote" event, Thursday afternoon in front of the Student Services Building to increase voting awareness.

The event kicked off at noon and ended at 3 p.m., with mayor of Windermere, Gary Bruhn, speaking to Valencia students.

"You're going to have a decision to make," said Bruhn. "Do your research and vote because every vote counts."

Oak Ridge High School marching band got the event started by playing several songs before SGA West Campus President Ethan King introduced the Windermere mayor.

Campaign staff from both Obama and Romney camps occupied a small section of the courtyard, attempting to sway Valencia student voters.

"We want to motivate you guys to vote," said King.

Early voting in Florida began on Saturday and with the Sunshine State being a potential decider in the election, awareness around the Central Florida area is spreading.

According to a new poll released Monday by CNN/ORC International, GOP candidate Mitt Romney holds 50 percent of Florida voters, while President Obama holds 49 percent.

"The decisions that you make will affect not only today, but what will happen tomorrow," said Bruhn, who has been mayor of Windermere since 2004 and has served four straight terms.

Early voting began on Saturday and will end on Election Day, Tuesday, Nov. 6.

Clinton takes over UCF rally

Obama leaves Orlando, cancels campaign speech

ORLANDO — Former President Bill Clinton spoke at a rally Monday morning at the University of Central Florida, encouraging college students and community to vote early.

The former president was expected to open for President Barack Obama, but with Hurricane Sandy threatening the Northeast, Obama cancelled his appearance to return to Washington, leaving Clinton to address supporters.

"Vote for the man with a plan, vote for Barack Obama," said Clinton, in front of thousands of students at UCF's Memory Mall. "This guy has taken on more tough problems in less time and gotten good results, but we couldn't get well in four years."

Early voting began on Saturday and with election day one week away, Clinton encouraged those in attendance to vote before Nov. 6.

"If you had a hole to fill, would you dig it deeper before you fill it," said Clinton on Romney's economic policy.



Clinton promoted "Obamacare," saying that Romney is criticizing the same plan that Romney himself established when he was Massachusetts' governor.

"Let's look at what this terrible, terrible law has done, oh it's awful," said Clinton on Mitt Romney's attack on Obama's health care reform law.

"For the last two years, for the first time in 51 years, medical cost inflation has been 4 percent or less in two years

in-a-row," he added.

Chants of "four more years" echoed the Memory Mall, as students showed support for Obama's re-election.

Clinton added that Obama proposes a better health care plan for America and will not turn Medicare into a voucher program, which the Obama campaign has scrutinized the Romney campaign for suggesting.

Other talking points included the rising costs of going to school.

"Mr. Romney wants to gut student aid," said Clinton on Romney's education policy.

"The most important thing President Obama has done is to reform the student loan program and allow it to initiate to help universities and colleges cut the rate of inflation in half in college costs," said Clinton. "No college graduate have to take a job just to pay a bill."

The event kicked off with replacement opener Charlie Crist, former Florida governor, who hyped up the crowd by comparing Obama's current policies to that Romney's.

According to Crist, "Jobs now are up, unem-

Lake brings new lab option

Students explore ecosystems

WEST CAMPUS — Walking around Lake Pamela this Wednesday, students and faculty experienced an in-depth tour of Valencia's very own allnatural body of water and its surrounding nature.

Valencia College Director of Sustainability, Deborah Green, conducted a tour around the campus's lake, which was formed by a sinkhole in the prehistoric period. Speaking to a group of 20 people, Green touched on the educational possibilities of Lake Pamela.

"We're trying to make the campus a living laboratory," said Green. "We need more professors to make better use of it."

The environmentalist pointed out many native and invasive plants and trees which line the lake's shoreline. Over 20 species of foliage and vegetation litter Lake Pamela.

Dahoon holly, one of Florida's native trees, can be found along the trail. Green informed the tour that the red berries growing from the tree are not edible, adding that any red or black berries are not healthy; however blue berries are perfectly fine to consume.

Nature enthusiasts participating in the tour picked and smelled red bay leaves, which are commonly used for flavor in soup. These leaves can be easily identified by their copious veins found on the backside of the leaf.

Lake Pamela is currently in a stage of recovery due to pollution caused by runoff from the St. Augustine grass located on the slope between the cafeteria patio and the shoreline.

Concerned environmentalists on campus found that if you keep a natural border of growth around the water it prevents unwanted chemicals from

tainting the lake and its inhabitants. Lily pads and other healthy plant life throughout the lake are a good indication of progressive restoration.

Throughout the nature walk, participants were able to see the progress of many sustainable projects underway. These works include the recently constructed butterfly garden, a wild flower patch, and the Tree Campus U.S.A. program.

Walking along the pathway lined with dune sunflowers and guinea grass, Terrell Walton, a student at Valencia, took interest in the environmental awareness walk. "Nature means a lot to me, the more we lose our trees, the more we lose our city's natural beauty," said Walton.

Valencia College's president, Dr. Sanford Shugart, signed the American College and University President's Climate Commitment in 2009. Since then Valencia's West campus has had an impressive track record of low greenhouse gas emissions. According to Green, there's still more to do.

"We've yet to begin to scratch the surface on our carbon footprint."

Long, complex ballot intimidating to voters

One of the most notable impacts of this year's political election, for students, is the size and complexity of our local ballot.

Many concerned voters across the state are pointing out that this year's ballot — containing four pages and over 4,000 words - can intimidate and discourage voters who are less informed about current issues. Some students know who they want for president of the United States, but they may not find potential changes to the amendments that easy to determine.

All the extra wording, added to this year's sample ballot, comes from proposed actions like Amendment 4, which contains over 600 words and has to be translated into Spanish. This amendment alone takes up one entire page.

There are 12 amendments proposed, with additional questions affecting the state charter. To be a fully-informed voter, this entails quite a lot of research.

On election day, people who feel intimidated by complex language may decide that they are not confident enough with their decision due to a lack in comprehension.

Voters who haven't looked over the sample ballots, which were mailed out over a week ago, could contribute to long lines and added confusion at polling stations on Nov. 6.

We spoke with students on Valencia's West Campus to gauge their reaction to the sample ballots they had recently reviewed.

Would the complex wording and overall length of the ballot discourage you from placing your vote?









New '007' film hits international theatres

"Skyfall" debuts # 1 in 25 countries

Sony Pictures is spying a hit in its latest James Bond film, as "Skyfall" premiered at No. 1 in 25 foreign countries this weekend.

The film, starring Daniel Craig in the 23rd entry featuring 007, collected an impressive \$77.7 million overseas this

weekend, according to an estimate from Sony, which is distributing the film internationally. "Skyfall," financed by Sony and Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer for just under \$200 million, doesn't hit U.S. theaters until Nov. 9.

Of the 25 international markets that the film played in this weekend, it easily did best on Bond's home turf, Britain. The picture sold \$32.4 million worth of tickets there the biggest opening of the year so far and 30 percent ahead of the opening for Craig's last Bond film, 2008's "Quantum of Solace."

Business also was strong in France, where the movie grossed \$9.1 million, and in Russia, where receipts amounted to \$8.6 million. "Solace" ultimately collected \$417.7 million abroad, roughly 71 percent of its worldwide gross.

The strong international bow for "Skyfall" bodes well for its U.S. prospects, especially since early reviews have been



exceptionally positive. As of Sunday, the movie had earned a 94 percent fresh rating on Rotten Tomatoes.





Faculty's other side Teaching as day job for real-world artists

EAST CAMPUS — The opening reception for part one of the Faculty Fine Art gallery series featured works by Valencia teachers on the East Campus, Friday night.

Jackie Otto Miller, curator of the Anita S. Wooten gallery where the show took place, presented two of her own paintings.

Debussy's "Prelude to an Evening of a Faun" played in the background as students and artists alike joined in light conversation surrounding the mixed media pieces around them.

"Art is a carrier of ideas," Miller said, "representing the social fiber of the environment, the spiritual condition of the world."

Lindsay Singer, photo laboratory assistant, said, "We had a great selection this year. It's fantastic that kids get a taste of what their teachers are really like during their free time outside of the classroom."

The Fine Art Faculty show takes place once a year, offering half of the staff a chance to display their works this year and giving the others a chance next year.

A juror goes through 150 of the entries and picks 50 to go into the gallery.

Throughout the discourse of the night, now that there are less than two weeks before election day, there was a subtle politically charged theme winding its way into the discussions.

Speaking about the work of Camilo Velasquez, Valencia alumnus Gene Valentine said he found controversy lurking between the lines of poetry amid the photographs of William Tecumseh Sherman, a general in the Union Army during the Civil War.

"They're really political, targeting anything mainstream. It's an observation of history, that's what really caught my eye," said Valentine.

Valentine is curating his own gallery at City Arts Factory, titled "Incursion," in January of next year.

Going by the name of simply "Kyle," he is a teacher of drawing and design at Valencia, who spoke about the importance of understanding today's news and the ways that people of the world are changing every day.

While discussing with students the meaning behind his "Floating, Falling" piece, which features iconic archetypes of comic book heroes and heroines, among other baseball players and one woman scrambling to recover her bag of groceries that was tossed in the air, he said, "It's like politics today. Both of these men are brilliant and they're calling each other liars."

Kyle said, "It feels like truth is escaping us. We're losing a sense of true north. I think people feel like they're falling, like they're floating."

Allan Maxwell, drawing and photog-

raphy professor, used this opportunity to display his empathy toward victims of trauma, those who suffer through social calamity and the struggle to be part of the human family all while being beaten down and left alone to rot in their corner of this cruel world.

"This is my frustration over the last 10 years," Maxwell said, "of the church and Penn. State, from people who should be protecting you, who instead take advantage."

He uses the inherent contrast between

the otherworldly images, seen in color negatives, and has juxtaposed them against images of the human figure, which is shown in the natural setting of a well-lit studio.

Also on display were photographs of buildings whose sides were used as one big sprawling canvas for those skilled in the art of graffiti, stone-cut and woodladen pottery set up on a stand in the corner of the gallery and the ghostly figure of "So-Yeon" hovered amid two women who clutched close their red cloaks

against the chill of her ghostly spirit.

When you come to a show like this and interact with students and their revered professors, it's unlike any environment you can find on another campus, according to Kyle.

"The teachers here are real-world artists. Here at Valencia, you're learning about art from artists," said Kyle.

The Fine Art Faculty exhibition will remain in the Anita S. Wooten, on the East Campus in Bldg. 3 until Dec. 14, and is open to the public.



Country turned pop star seeing "Red"

Taylor Swift's new album brings new genres, sound

Taylor Swift is back with her 4th studio album, "Red", which hit stores last Monday. The 16 track album has already hit #1 on the Billboard charts and has 6 singles which have all topped the charts.

One of the recent singles out is "We Are Never Getting Back Together", which currently sits on the top ten most downloaded songs on iTunes.

The album follows Swift's previous album "Speak Now", which came out in 2010 and sold millions of copies.

Taylor broke into the music scene in 2006 with her "Country Album" and even though unconventional, she gained popularity and was thrust into the mainstream. She is seen as a few of the artist who are

reinventing the outlook on pop culture.

The now Grammy-Award-winning songstress is about to break the female record of having the most albums that have reached sales of over a million copies within their first week of release.

Even before the album came out, she released three other singles; "Begin Again", "I Knew You Were Trouble" and Red, which all debuted at number one on iTunes, something very rare to see.

"All those emotions, spanning from intense love, intense frustration, jealousy, confusion, all of that, in my mind, all those emotions are red. You know, there's nothing in between. There's nothing beige about any of those feelings." Swift explained in her Google Plus livechat.

Swift, which is known for writing all her songs about her ex's says that this album expressed all of her emotions. All of which she saw as "Red."

"All the different emotions that are written about on this album are all pretty much about the kind of tumultuous, crazy, insane, intense, semi-toxic relationships that I've experienced in the last two years," said Swift.

One thing unique about this album is that it is the first time that swift actually collaborates with other writers to help her with her music. She also tried different music genres.

Although being known as a country artist, she chose to incorporate different sounds, like auto tune and more poplike tracks. But even then the listener can

find the traditional ballads and the occasional sound of a banjo.

The first track on the album "State of grace", sounds a lot like a song that Coldplay would do. Focusing very heavy on the instruments, it is an atmospheric track and reminds me a lot of Coldplay's infamous song "Clocks."

The title track, "Red", is also one of the albums openers and features a slow paced start with an upbeat chorus featuring some auto tune.

Some critics have said that this new sound does not suit her, but obviously the sales say different. With "Red" having already sold over 900 million copies within the first 4 days and it is destined to hit the 1 million mark before the end of its release week. The album will surely be successful.

Taylor will follow up the album with a promotional north American tour starting in 2013.

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Solar Bears endure first home loss Greenville shut Orlando in shootouts right before 4-game road stretch

ORLANDO -- Solar Bears' new goalie Mike Brodeur gave up three goals in just as many shootout attempts, while all three Orlando players came up empty on their tries Sunday afternoon during the Solar Bears' 6-5 shootout loss to the Greenville Road Warriors at the Amway Center.

The Solar Bears, who started goalie Mike Brodeur for the first time all season, gave up two early goals in the first period, but were able to narrow Greenville's lead to one, when forward Olivier Fortier scored on a Solar Bears power play late in the period.

"We didn't compete for the full 60 minutes, we competed in parts of the game and we just made some mental mistakes," said Solar Bears coach Drake Berehowsky of his team's play after the game.

Orlando played much better in the second period, and that showed with three unanswered goals for the Solar Bears. Alternate captain Kevin Baker got his first goal of the season less than five minutes into the period, thanks in part to assists by Ryan Cruthers and center Mathew Sisca.

Kyle Medvec was able to give Orlando its first lead of the evening when he put the puck in the back of the net mid-

way through the second period.

Greenville was able to score early in the third period, to cut the Solar Bears' lead to one, before a goal by Rob Mignardi put Orlando back up by two.

The Road Warriors came back with two goals of their own in the final three minutes of regulation.

The game tying goal came with 11 seconds left in the game when Green-

ville was able to get a score from Sean Berkstresser shortly after pulling their goalie.

Ryan Cruthers also scored for the Solar Bears during regulation time, making him and Mathew Sisca the only Orlando players with a point in every game this season.

Sisca had two assists during the night, both of which came during a three goal second period for the Solar Bears.

"No excuses for losing that game, we should have won, it was 5-3 with four minutes left," said Sisca following the game.

Nick Petersen also had two assists for the Solar Bears on Sunday, following a brief one-game stint with the Houston Areos over the weekend. Petersen still leads the ECHL in scoring with his 14th goal of the season.

The shootout loss marked the second time the Solar Bears had been in shootout this season, the only other time coming in Orlando's home opening win against the Florida Everblades.

With the loss, the Solar Bears' record falls to 3-1-1-1, but they do come away with a valuable point in the standings. With the one point the Bears jump into a three way tie for second place in the south division standings.

The team now hits the road for a four-game road trip, before returning home on Nov. 7 to host the Gwinnett Gladiators on back-to-back days.
