A temple-ting offering **Campus group hosts trip to Buddhist sanctuary**

ORLANDO — Valencia College's Peace and Justice Initiative will join the Guang Ming Temple on Friday, March 29 from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. for a night of multicultural enlightenment.

As part of the Peace and Justice Initiatives' fourth goal, to "offer community outreach in peace and justice," students, faculty and staff will receive a tour of the temple, participate in a presentation on Buddhism, indulge in a

vegetarian dinner, practice calligraphy and partake in a tea ceremony.

Guang Ming, meaning "Bright Light" in Mandarin, is one branch of Venerable Master Hsing Yuns' original monastery Fo Guang Shan, founded in Taiwan during 1967. Venerable Master Hsing Yuns' global mission "of propagating Humanistic Buddhism and establishing a pure land on Earth," has taken foothold in the Orlando community, currently serving as one of the largest Buddhist temples in Central Florida.

The Temples' main mission is "to nurture talents through education, benefit societies through charitable programs and purify human hearts and mind through Buddhist practices."

By aligning with the Peace and Justice Initiatives' promotion of multicultural acceptance and nonviolent conflict resolution, this event will showcase the cooperation between different cultures and the multicultural communication skills necessary to progress in today's global community.

OSCEOLA CAMPUS - Valencia students and faculty rolled up their sleeves and gave life saving levels of plasma to the Big Red Bus parked outside of Building 2 last week, in efforts to get blood and bone marrow donations for the National Cesar E. Chavez Blood Drive Challenge.

The Cesar Chavez Blood Drive Challenge is a nationally recognized event hosted each year, where more than 250 colleges and universities nationwide compete in efforts to save lives by getting people to donate blood. Valencia Volunteers hosted the event with help from the Florida's Blood Center and Be the Match, a national marrow donor program. Valencia's currently holds the trophy for winning the 2012 competition and looks to repeat this year.

"Many students do not know who Chavez is, so we are not only here to get blood donations but also raise awareness of his legacy and serve as educational purpose," said Bernard Huggins, event organizer at Osceola campus.

"Quamar stop being so mean," says Dwevelie Gaspard after her husband makes fun of someone for wearing an out of style shirt.



"Valencia has a high Latino population and without the efforts of [Chavez] they might not have had the same opportunities to attend school."

Chavez, a civil right activist and humanitarian, who lived by the motto "Si se puede!" ("Yes, it can be done!") helped ordinary people do extraordinary things.

Chavez started the National Farm Workers Association where he looked to improve the working conditions of farm workers throughout the nation. Chavez's, who has been considered "one of the heroic figures of our time" by Robert F. Kennedy, principles and beliefs are still relevant today thanks in part to the Cesar Chavez Foundation.

"I am not allowed to donate blood." explained Sarah Siraj, worker for Florida's Blood Center, due to growing up in England where many civilians carry



Mad Cow Disease. "My mother needed a transfusion growing up and I couldn't help, this is a way I can give back."

There are some reasons that may prevent you from donating such as age or weight. Donors must complete an eligibility checklist prior to donating, which asks

different questions regarding health, travel and medications being used. If someone is a healthy eligible donor then they can give blood up to every eight weeks.

Maria Mendez, an avid donor, said that she would donate every day if they let her.

"Everyone can do their own part, they just have to find what works for them."

Participants who came out to donate received free gifts such as a voucher for a free movie ticket and a t-shirt. While donors waited they could enjoy music from Orlando's own Spanish radio station KQ103, who set up an informational tent, as well as play ping pong and enjoy courtesy snacks.






Spring break from reality 'Breakers' breaks the norm, teen actors defy and deliver



Crying is a big part of this film, and, whether you like it or not, you had best get used to it. Chances are big that you will be doing some crying before this faux tragedy is over.

Paul Rudd is not that fun to watch, and not really very funny in this movie.

Spotlight on NCAA bracket Florida Gulf Coast living improbable dream, make Sweet 16

SAN JOSE - This is Florida Gulf Coast's tournament now, mostly because nobody had ever heard of Florida Gulf Coast until three days ago, and now there's hardly anybody else worth discussing.

Just the Eagles, who come from a school

that only opened in 1997, became eligible for the NCAA tournament last year, laid waste to Georgetown and San Diego State, and apparently has more high-flying talent than your normal NBA Slam Dunk Contest and more chutzpah than the rest of the tournament field put together.

On Sunday, FGCU became the first 15th seed to ever move to the Sweet 16 and if you watched that procession of lob dunks and celebratory shimmies, you can easily imagine this trip going on and on.

So let's figure out what's left for FGCU and who's out there to try to stop them from becoming the highest seed to advance to a Final Four . . . or more.

First, let's just make it clear: Florida Gulf Coast is obviously the most talented 15th seed ever and probably could match rosters with a lot of 5 and 6 seeds, to be honest. How this happened, I do not know.

But this is a great story because FGCU was 59th out of 68 teams in the NCAA's true seeding, and they're making distinguished programs look like junior colleges.

It's about Sherwood Brown, Brett Comer and Chase Fieler going full tilt on every play, it's about coach Andy Enfield orchestrating the madness, and, yes, it helps that he's married to a former supermodel.

The Eagles are what the tournament is about, especially now that the talent is so spread out, now that so many top teams

can't seem to shoot or pass, and the teams with a few playmakers, guts, and total cohesion can come out of nowhere.

Even from Fort Myers, Florida.

So what could stop them? First, there's Florida on Friday in the regional semi, which would be a tense, no-win situation for the Gators, no question.

If the Gators beat down FGCU, they're ruining a dream. If Florida loses, it's an all-time party all around Eagle Nation.

Florida is an incredible defensive team that just ground down Minnesota, but San Diego State is a good defensive team, too, and FGCU turned that game turned into something ridiculous.

If the Eagles get past Florida, they'd either face Michigan or Kansas, who play in the other South semifinal.

The Wolverines put on one of the most thorough team performances of the tournament to annihilate VCU on Saturday; I think Michigan would be a tougher matchup for FGCU than Kansas would.

And Kansas has been a wobbly No. 1 seed, looking not so great against Western Kentucky the whole game and for a half versus North Carolina into the national title game. There's where it stops, though, even in FGCU Dream land. In the last game, if it gets that far, I think it'll be either Louisville or Michigan State as the last barrier, and the Eagles aren't getting past that one.

Solar Bears trump Cyclones

Attendance of 9,329 at Amway on Fan Appreciation Day

ORLANDO – Derrick Martin scored his first goal of the season as the Orlando Solar Bears defeated the Cincinnati Cyclones 2-1 on March 24 in front 9,329 fans at the Amway Center on Fan Appreciation Day.

"Great crowd tonight," said Martin after the game. "Scoring at home in a big crowd feels good, I don't care who you are. It's always a great feeling and you do it in front of the home fans."

Patrick Killeen also contributed to the win, saving 31 out of 31 shots in net for Orlando, giving him his tenth win of the season for the Solar Bears.

"Patty played really well," said Solar Bears head coach Drake Berehowsky about Killeen's performance between the pipes. "I thought, defensively, we kept the shots to the outside and when they did come from the inside he stopped the ones he was supposed to."

when he scored off a Matt Smyth pass with 15:12 left Wilson about the team's performance, including to play in the opening period.

Michael Wilson tied the game at 1-1 for the Solar Bears when he scored a power play goal thanks to an assist from Nick McParland with 11:10 remaining in the first period.

Martin gave Orlando a 2-1 lead early in the second period when he scored his first goal of the season for the Solar Bears with 12:27 left to play in the second period.

"It obviously feels good," said Martin about scoring his first goal of the season. "But goal scoring's never been my forte anyway."

Orlando entered the third period leading 2-1 de-

spite being outshot 19-9 by Cincinnati during the first two periods.

The Cyclones outshot the Solar Bears 13-8 during the final period but could not come away with a goal despite having four power plays.

"Everyone played pretty well tonight, kept ev-Mike Embach gave Cincinnati an early 1-0 lead erything simple and kept shots to the outside," said Killeen. "Killer as well played unbelievable, he's been playing unbelievable the last month I'd say."
