6th annual film fest takes you on a tour

WEST CAMPUS -- Capoeira, food and film dominated Friday's 6th annual Brazilian Film Festival.

The festival aims to introduce Valencia students to Brazilian culture by exposing students to five Brazilian films over the course of just one week. Featuring a world premier of producer Elisa Tolomellis' "Margaret Mee and the Moonflower" along with modern dramas and classic love stories, this film festival had a range of genres to choose from.



Put together by Valencia Portuguese Professor Richard Sansone, this week of cultural enlightenment has been designed to connect the vastly diverse Valencia community to the Brazilian culture that a staple of Central Florida.

Bringing its own dances, music, films and martial arts, the influence of Brazil's culture is ever increasing in Orlando's already diverse community.

Brazil has certainly been in the global spotlight of late. With plans to host both the 2014 Olympics and World Cup, Brazil has certainly defined itself as a modern country prepared to share

Nowhere is this culture showcased more intimately than in Friday's feature film "Gonzaga," a story documenting the strained relationship a of folk music icon and his pop-star son.

Luis Gonzaga grew up as the poor son of an instrument repairman in the rural northeastern portion of Brazil. Struggling to overcome cultural barriers, Gonzaga lamented the restrictions of ethnicity and poverty that plagued his young love life and sought out power and prestige in the Brazilian army.

KISSIMMEE -- Believe it or not there's a new sport out there that may seem like a big fantasy but is played nation and world wide. You wonder what sport it is? Quidditch is the game.

Quidditch is a sport based in the world of the Harry Potter series. The game is played by two teams of seven people (three Chasers, two Beaters, one Keeper, and one Seeker) and involves four balls (a Quaffle, two Bludgers, and a Golden Snitch), according to the official World Cup Quidditch website.

"Quidditch is a co-ed, full-contact sport that combines elements of rugby, dodgeball, and Olympic handball, with four balls (plus a human snitch) and seven players per team vying for control of an elliptical pitch," reads the website for the World Cup.

Also according to the site, "Eighty of the best teams in the world, hailing from across the US and as far away as Australia, France, Canada, the UK, and Mexico, will compete for the championship title."

Now who could believe its a real sport? Well many schools around the world actually play Quidditch, including big name universities like John Hopkins, Florida State, UCLA, Baylor and many others.


About 80 teams Qualify. But two of the best schools make it to the Quidditch World Cup six.

After his ten years had passed, Gonzaga pursued his music career in Rio and became close friends with another musician and his wife. During his time in Rio, Gonzaga met a beautiful lady by the name of Leah who became the mother of his first child.

While struggling to balance his career as a musician, family life and his wife's developing tuberculosis, Gonzaga turns to his friend and partner to help raise his son.

"This is not an uncommon arrangement in Brazil," said Sansone. "Children that are raised by someone else's parents are commonplace because the notion of extended family is far different in Brazil, than here in the US."

With an estranged father and a lost mother, Gonzaga's child finds refuge from the tumultuous world of his upbringing in his guitar, which ultimately propels him to stardom.

When asked about the impression left by this film, students' reactions were diverse.

One of Sansones' students, Alexis, said that "as a baby my dad left me with my grandmother, and thats how I was raised."

From nostalgia to longing, the first installment of the Brazilian film festival has certainly made its mark on the Valencia community and brought two diverse cultures together.

Films run through the week, ending with the premiere of "Margaret Mee and the Moonflower" on Friday April 12 at 7 p.m., preceded by a reception at 6:30 p.m. at West Campus, Building 3 Room 111.

On Thursday April 11, look out for "Dois Coelhos," which translates to "Two



Student directed shorts storm the stage at East this week

EAST CAMPUS -- Student directed short plays will be performed at the Black Box Theater on April 10 and 17 at 1p.m.

Sixteen 10-30 minute long plays will be performed in total, with eight short plays being performed per date.

The student directed short plays are a classroom lab project that connects between the Directing and Acting II classes.

"Each director selected a short play and we had auditions for them a couple of months ago. The

main actors are the students who are taking Acting II," said Julia Gagne, Professor and Artistic director of the Valencia College Theater Program.

"The auditions were open to all students, not just the Acting II students, so there are many 'volunteer' actors in the casts. The directors are responsible for setting a rehearsal schedule, and working with the actors to get them performance ready."

Second year theater and performing arts student, Jared Zonne, is directing Tennessee William's "Talk To Me Like the Rain...And Let Me Listen." The play takes place in a Manhattan apartment, where a man and woman are arguing. The "constant rain along with the subtle argument depicts their deepest loneliness," said Zonne.

Acting II student Jessica Meguiar was cast in "For Whom the Southern Belle Tolls."

"Being directed by someone else who is also learning as you're learning our craft is a very different experience," said Meguiar. "It's a lot of working together."

Zonne and Meguiar both said that everyone had to work on fitting their schedules together for their rehearsals.

"It's a wonderful opportunity," said Zonne. "Lots of students are getting their first experience at directing who want to do it in the future."

The first round of plays debut on April 10 at 1:00 p.m. as part of Program A. Program B premieres the following week, April 17 at 1 p.m. Both programs are free and both are in the Black Box Theater on East Campus.

Seriously sadistic

'Evil Dead' lives up to its name, delivers the fear

Something really weird happened to me while I was watching "Evil Dead." I felt fear and revulsion.

In today's era of the pop-up scare, these are not two things that often go hand in hand. Even better, though, the entire audience was scared and repulsed right along with me, because "Evil Dead" is a thorough film that leaves no stone unturned while searching for the entrance to your nightmares.

It's a reboot in an era of reboots, but it stands out as something very different from everything else on the market.

"Evil Dead" is a film about five kids (because five is the magic number in these sorts of films) who take a trip out to a cabin for an old fashioned cold turkey

extravaganza. Mia (Jane Levy) is ready to leave all that behind her and and her brother David (Shiloh Fernandez) is finally ready to be there for his sister. Things begin to go horribly wrong when the five find a book downstairs and one of them decides to read from it.

Apparently, not one of these people has ever seen a horror film of any kind, because Horror Film rule number one states that you never read from a book that looks to be bound with human skin. Also, when bad things begin to happen, you don't split from the group at the first opportunity.

Unfortunately for the five, things happen in this film and these things will haunt your waking thoughts because they are scary and, most importantly, they look real. The makeup was very well done, and one shot in particular

captures one of the group with her face halfway ripped off and it's ghastly and it's beautiful.

The "Evil Dead" has skin ripped off, arms detached from pesky bodies, and enough body piercings to make a goth squeamish. It also has an easy way about it and some very interesting comedy.

I say interesting, because a lot of the laughter comes when the movie is at its most sadistic and, more than likely, it will make you feel very bad.

What will not make you feel bad is the caliber of acting from the cast. While none of them will be getting any Oscars anytime soon, they do a very good job of displaying fear and disbelief while also being funny on occasion. A little piece of me felt sad every time one of them would die; always a good sign.

Go ahead and watch "Evil Dead" and remember that things do lurk in the dark.

EAST CAMPUS -- As the lights gradually illuminate the stage of the Black Box Theater, an average hotel room comes into focus, setting the stage for a night of intrigue, romance and disparity.

"Eros in Veracruz" was written by Orlando playwright Jack Mcgrath and performed by a cast of Valencia performing arts students, led by director Julia Gagne.

Taking place in the tumultuous towns of Veracruz and Ciudad, Mexico, the plot follows the protagonist Danny's search for his long lost father and the fight for his one true love. In a world controlled by drug cartels and gang violence, Danny's search is certain to be an adventure.

Upon arriving in Veracruz, Danny connects with his childhood friend and cousin, Angel. A lover of good times and fast living, Angel urges Danny to immerse himself in the local nightlife.

After rescuing the beautiful Mariposa from the clutches of a violent drug dealer, Danny finds himself caught up in a turbulent love affair with a woman whose beauty is matched only by her complexity.

As Danny helps Mariposa to rest on his hotel bed, he discovers something that will shape the entirety of his remaining journey, a kilo of cocaine. While leaving Manuel, a local Cartel member, Mariposa had stolen his cocaine absent-

mindedly while wearing his leather jacket. Soon after, Angel bursts into the room and urges Mariposa to leave. Having grown up with Mariposa, Angel knows all too well the danger she poses to the young millionaire, Danny.

Despite the danger, the two seek out a life together away from the cartels.

While attempting their escape the two are separated, and begin the trek down their final paths. Having been captured by Cartel leader Carlos while attempting to flee into the US, Mariposa is once again caught in the grasp of the Cartel. Undeterred by the danger, Danny seeks to rescue his love from the grasp of certain death, no matter what the cost.

"Eros in Veracruz" is a stunning play because the story it depicts is one all too familiar to the Mexican people. Because of the high demand for narcotics and the predominantly poor population, drug cartels have become increasingly powerful in the Mexican community.

Offering quick money to a desperate population allows the cartels to roam free and manipulate all forms of trade and life as seen in the intrepid love of Danny and Mariposa.

"This was my first time acting and I enjoyed it very much," said Shary Martinez, who played Mariposa.

As a mother and aspiring dental hygienist, Martinez has defined herself as a versatile young actress.


Payton to be enshrined

Chosen among seven into the Naismith Hall of Fame

Nine-time NBA All-Star Gary Payton, who played 13 seasons for the Sonics, will be inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame.

The announcement and the 2013 class will be revealed Monday at a news conference in Atlanta before the NCAA's men's championship game.

Payton is one of 12 finalists. The others are former NBA stars Spencer Haywood, Maurice Cheeks, Bernard King, Tim Hardaway and Mitch Richmond, former Celtics coach Tom Heinsohn, former University of Houston coach Guy Lewis, Louisville coach Rick Pitino, former UNLV coach Jerry Tarkanian, former WNBA star Dawn Staley and North Carolina's women's coach Sylvia Hatchell.

Finalists need 18 of 24 votes from the Honors Committee to be elected.

Richmond tweeted this week he will not be inducted this year. Lewis told The Associated Press that he will be inducted.

A source told The Seattle Times that Payton was a unanimous Hall of Fame choice.

The 6-foot-4, 180-pound guard is considered one of the best defensive players in NBA history. He's the only point guard to win the league's defensive player of the year award and was a first-team all-defensive team choice nine times. He made the All-NBA team nine times.


Payton, drafted No. 2 overall out of Oregon State in 1990, averaged 16.3 points, 6.9 assists and 4 rebounds during a 17-year career.

Two words are often used to describe Payton: brash and durable.

The Oakland, Calif., native was one of the game's notorious trash-talkers, who jabbered away at opposing players, coaches and fans while constantly bobbing his head.

Often Payton backed up his words with deeds.

He missed just five games during his Sonics career three due to injury and two because of separate team and league suspensions and started every other contest.

The pinnacle of Payton's career with the Sonics came in 1996 when he led the team to the NBA Finals against Michael Jordan and the Chicago Bulls. Seattle lost 4-2. After a change in ownership and a contract dispute, the Sonics traded Payton to the Milwaukee Bucks in 2003. He went to the NBA Finals with the Los Angeles Lakers in 2004 and spent a season with the Boston Celtics before finishing his career with the Miami Heat. where he won an NBA title in 2006. His last season was 2006-07.

Payton was a member of the gold-medal 1996 and 2000 U.S. men's Olympic basketball teams.

The Hall of Fame previously announced five new members.

Payton and the other new members will be enshrined during a Sept. 8 ceremony in Springfield, Mass.
